TOWN ELECTIONS

Have you ever considered holding an elected office in Meridian Hills? On November 6, residents will elect representatives to oversee Town affairs for the next four years. There are four elected positions in Meridian Hills - three Town Councilors and a Clerk Treasurer. Any resident is eligible to submit his or her name as a candidate for these at-large positions. The Town Council meets on the second Monday of every month at 7:00 pm for approximately two hours. In addition, each member chairs at least one of the five committees, which meet on a schedule decided by the members. The Clerk Treasurer oversees the

nance/repair. He or she is also responsible for filing all government reports and forms. The Town Council members are paid \$1,600 per year. The Clerk Treasurer is paid \$7,800 per year and has a part time assistant. You can find out more by

SECOND PRESBYTERIAN EXPANSION

The much-anticipated completion of the Second Presbyterian Church has finally arrived. The Dedication was Sunday, May 6th. The work is beautifully and artistically done, with the same Indiana limestone and tile roof as the main structure. It is difficult to tell the original from the new.

When asked about the hopes for the future of Second Presbyterian, members and leaders envisioned expanding the potential of the church's ministries, as well as improving access to the main sanctuary. This vision was realized through the very generous donation of a respected member and leader of the church, with the balance received through member pledges and gifts.

The new space encompasses three floors and an atrium. The new north entrance will serve as a reception area with a library, hospitality center, sitting area and coffee bar. Mounted LCD televisions will display ongoing activities and provide live video of weekly services. The second floor will serve as home for the youth ministries, with state-ofthe-art facilities designed to serve more than 500 middle and high school students.

The third floor, the Great Hall, is a large gathering room with beautiful windows and vaulted ceiling. This magnificent space will be used for weddings, concerts, congregational events, lectures, and other special events. A walkway across a sky bridge will connect the new addition to the main sanctuary.



Reduce! Reuse! Recycle!

The environment has been in the headlines quite a bit recently. Although some issues have become politicized, one thing we can all agree on is our responsibility to preserve and protect our environment. No one wants to see litter on the side of the road

or breathe dirty air. What can we do as residents of Meridian Hills? **Reduce! Reuse! Recycle!** Many Meridian Hills residents participate in curbside recycling offered by Republic Waste Service (926-5491). Pickup is once a week on your normal trash

day and costs just \$5.50 per month. Many residents also recycle clothing, furniture and other household items by donating to St. Vincent DePaul (687-0169), Goodwill (253-0190), or Am-Vets (353-8140). Most organizations pick up larger items from your home. Other tips to reduce use of resources include the following:

- Use compact fluorescent bulbs
- Drive less; drive more fuel efficient cars; and check your tire pressure regularly
 - Buy EnergyStarrated appliances
 - Install dual-paned windows

• Use a mulching lawnmower

• For shopping, use a canvas bag or reuse a plastic or paper bag

- Adjust thermostat by 2 degrees
- Turn lights off when not in use
- Plant a tree
