## **DEALING WITH SOLICITORS**

Just as you get the baby to sleep for an afternoon nap, the doorbell rings making the dog bark and waking the baby. ....so much for your peaceful afternoon! We've all experienced the intrusion of door-to-door solicitors, but what's the proper way to handle them? According to Town Marshal, Mike Russo, today's solicitors are very different than they've been in the past. He's seen vans drop off teenagers from the Chicago area to work the neighborhoods. Many wonder if a solicitor is a front for a thief looking for an open garage or an unlocked car. The Town cannot prohibit, cite and prosecute solicitors, however there are steps you can take to improve your personal safety and the safety of the Town in general.



- Post a tasteful "No Soliciting" sign at the end of your driveway
- Don't answer the door
- Call Meridian Hills police at 253-5678 to notify them of the solicitors

- If you do answer the door, keep the storm door or a chain locked and never open the door to a stranger
- Do not get in a conversation or debate, but politely say you are not interested and ask them to leave
- Call 9-1-1 if a solicitor becomes aggressive, threatening, or will not leave your property when asked

Nobody wants to prevent the girl scouts from selling cookies, but an aggressive adult at your front door can become dangerous. By notifying the Town police of solicitors, a deputy on duty can check out their credentials and let them know we're watching them so they may choose a different neighborhood.

- Don't hesitate to call 9-1-1 immediately to report any suspicious activity

- Don't leave purses, cell phones, computers, or packages in plain view in your car
- Lock your doors, including service doors, garage doors, and vehicle doors
- Install motion activated lights on your home

Officer Rick Batza suggests keeping your car keys on your night stand at night so you can press the panic button on your car alarm if you hear a noise outside your house. Any criminal will flee at the unwanted attention from the car alarm. One of the benefits of living in such a great community is that we know our neighbors and can keep an eye on one another.

serve on this committee.



# **Please Trim Your Trees for Safety**

The Town of Meridian Hills has been working closely with Jud Scott of Vine & Branch over the last several months to develop a Tree Inspection

Program (TIP). fact. Mr. Scott has used the Town of Meridian Hills as a prototype to develop this program to introduce it on a statewide and national level. The Town's goal is to elimipossible nate safety hazards that could not only hurt someone, but become

a financial liability for the Town. For the last four years, Kay Ivcevich has toured the Town annually with Mr. Scott, a Registered Consulting Arborist with the American Society of Consulting Arborists, and identified possible hazards including trees or shrubs that are dead, structurally unsound, or have foliage that might



lege and 71st Street. Because we don't have a full-time street department and have an extremely limited budget, we also rely on the cooperation of residents to address over-

grown trees and shrubbery. As you maintain the landscaping in the right-of-way in front of your homes, we ask that you look for overgrown branches blocking a traffic sign, weak trees that endanger the roadway

and any dead limbs that might fall on the right-of-way. The Town has sent letters directly to homeowners concerning trees and shrubs of concern. If you receive a letter, please address the trees or shrubs or in question for the safety of our residents. Sadly, in today's litigious society, anyone could be named in a lawsuit if a branch was blocking a traffic sign that resulted in an accident. Public safety is one of our highest priorities.



## **TOWN HAPPENINGS**

By the time you receive this newsletter, several projects the Council approved should be completed necessary asphalt repair on Town roads; restriping of 75th Street, Pennsylvania Street, and 73rd between Meridian and Pennsylvania; the installation of new stopbars on the road surface at primary intersections along 75th Street and along Pennsylvania Street; high priority tree trimming in Town right-ofway; and two large drainage projects affecting Town roads - one on Pennsylvania and another on 65th Street. The installation of the four Town entry signs the council approved has been delayed until early spring due to a scheduling conflict with the contractor. This delay will allow the contractor more time to complete site work. An added benefit is that the funds will remain in the bank earning approximately \$1,300 in interest, in essence reducing the overall cost of the project.

#### Visual Tree Assessment! Inspect your trees today!

Eight areas are examined during a Visual Tree Assessment. We will be sharing these with you over the next four newsletters to help you become more aware of the health of trees on your property. Here are the first two:

- Inspect the <u>ground around the root flare</u> (the area where the roots are growing underground)
- 2. Inspect the <u>root flare</u> itself (it sometimes looks like an "elephant's foot")

Make sure there is no fungus, rotting or damage (due to insects, storms, lawn equipment) on this area of the tree.

## **Engineer Review Policy**

The Development Standards & Residential Construction Committee has been working with the Town Engineer

to develop an Engineer Review Policy for new construction. Because our area is so desirable and ideally located, we've experienced incredible growth within the Town - from home additions to complete tear-downs and rebuilds.

The goal of an Engineer Review is to work with the residents, the builders, and the City to create an awareness of the standards within the Town of Meridian Hills. Any new construction within the Town that requires a building permit from the City of Indianapolis will require a review by the Town Engineer. There is a minimal fee charged to the property owner to offset the cost of the Engineer Review. The primary focus of the review is to make sure that

construction is compliant with our unique setbacks, while also making sure that drainage is adequately

addressed. A level of consistency applied by a professional engineer will safeguard many of the characteristics that make the Town of Meridian Hills unique. In the long run it could improve

property values and reduce the possibility of expensive construction changes made after the fact in order to be compliant. The Development Standards & Residential Construction Committee is currently reviewing final drafts of the Policy, along with the Town Engineer and Attorney. A final draft will then be submitted to the Town Council for consideration. Additional information will follow soon.
